Help with long transparent words:

- 1. Familiarize yourself with the stress patterns of some common Greek/Latin word roots.
- 2. Have model words that you KNOW how to say.
- 3. Start at the end of the word and work back
- 4. Check the pronunciation of the vowel i (kiss =/i/, eye= /ai/ or easy = /i:/?)
- 5. Make it sound English.

Some other common issues:

Psychology – no need to pronounce the /p/ - the beginning of this word sounds like cycling.

<u>Interesting</u> – careful to make the "in" rhyme with "bin" u- <u>unu</u>sual – 2 sounds for the letter U in English are within this word – the weak form "uh" and "you". The French "u" sound does not exist in English.

Equipment – QU – always ponounced like the Queen in English. through the – TH – not as important as many of the vowels and dipthongs for being understood. We shouldn't over estimate the importance of perfecting the TH sounds. However if you want to get it right – your tongue has to hit the back of your top teeth!
